



Orchard Hills


Suburb



Orchard Hills is a suburb that will experience significant transformation in the coming years. Set to transition from a rural area to a more urban setting. The new Sydney Metro – Western Sydney Airport includes a station at Orchard Hills and will stimulate jobs and housing growth within close proximity to new transport connections. Residents of Orchard Hills will benefit from new investment into the suburb including the creation of a new town centre and community infrastructure.

Currently, the community of Orchard Hills is older than the wider Penrith City LGA and it is important that we understand the changing needs of this community to ensure they live well as they age.

It is anticipated that the ongoing transformation of Orchard Hills will attract a more diverse and younger population.

Our population


The population of Orchard Hills has remained stable in the last five years.



The median age of those living in Orchard Hills is 47, compared to the median age of 35 in the wider Penrith City LGA.




Health

There are over 12,000 people in the Penrith City LGA who need help in their day-to-day lives due to disability. A significant proportion of the community live with at least one long-term health condition.


Residents in need of assistance due to disability




Residents with at least one long-term health condition




How we live

Medium density




High density

Many people have mortgage and rental payments that exceed 30% of their income, an indicator of housing stress.





48% of residents in the wider Penrith City LGA have completed Year 12 or equivalent (2021).

49% of Orchard Hills have no qualification, compared to 42% in the Penrith City LGA.

Orchard Hills has more people without formal qualifications than the Penrith City LGA.


Orchard Hills is transforming.
